COLLEGE EMBLEM



The Crown in the College Emblem represents Our Lady, Mother and Queen of Carmel. The cross at the centre represents Mount Carmel, which is the symbol of prayer and contemplation. The open ends of the cross indicate that Carmelites embrace the whole world with prayer and works of penance. The three stars represent the three epochs in the history of the order. The first star placed in the grotto of the mountain signifies the prophetic era, the second and the third stars rising above the mountain signify the Greek and Latin eras. The verse in the college emblem **“The Fear of the Lord is the Beginning of Wisdom”** is from the Book of Proverbs 9:10. The verse is a reminder to teachers and students that true wisdom comes from God and is given to those who have reverential love for God.

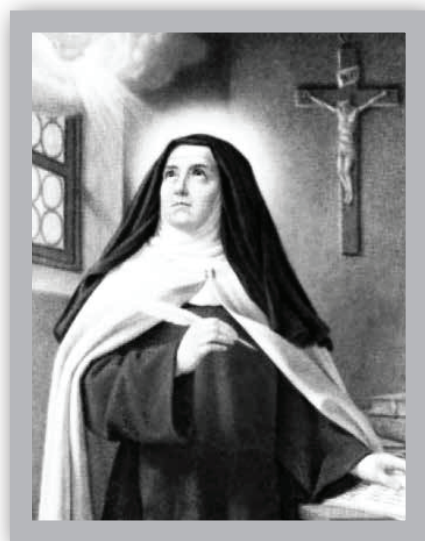

PATRONESS OF THE COLLEGE



The College is named after **St. Teresa of Avila**. Though a saint of the 16th Century, St. Teresa is a model for the youth of ages and time. Her teachings form the basis of Catholic Spirituality. She lived the life of a contemplative nun and was ennobled with the title **“Doctor of the Church.”** Allison Peers, who has translated her autobiography remarks, “Her purely human qualities and gifts, the saintliness of her life, the naturalness and candor of her manner and style, are some of the reasons why her name is not only graven upon the enduring marble of history but taken on the lips of generation after generation with reverence and love.”

OUR FOUNDRESS, SERVANT OF GOD **Mother Teresa of St. Rose of Lima**



1858-1902
A Visionary and an Educationist
Founded our Congregation on 24-04-1887

Mother Teresa of St. Rose of Lima was born as Mary Grace D'Lima on 29th January 1858, in Chennai. Her humble beginning was by no means a prelude of what was to come. An extraordinary human being, she felt that the path to women empowerment was through education. Indeed, it is this vision of hers that helped shape and mould the lives of many generations of women.

Mary Grace realized that her life's mission was to provide education to women. Her zeal and dedication was extraordinary and resulted in her being given charge of St. Joseph's School for girls in Alappuzha at the tender age of 21. It was while working with the Carmelite Missionaries,



that she received her calling. She went on to become a Carmelite Tertiary, taking the name of Sr. Teresa of St. Rose of Lima. By the age of 29 she was given the directive to form a convent and an English medium school for girls in Ernakulam. Her social conscience never wavered and the next 15 years were ground breaking. She founded a community of Carmelite Religious, started three schools, including an industrial school for orphaned children, launched programmes for destitute women and children besides starting a home for the aged and a dispensary.

Mother Teresa rose to every challenge and test that God put before her and saw in each difficulty an opportunity to serve her fellowmen better. She gave help in whatever manner she could when natural calamities struck. In an effort to aid the Government, she initiated the Famine Relief Programme in Ernakulam in 1897, and instigated the practice of offering Holy Mass in the Sub-Jail.

Though Mother Teresa passed away in a tragic and untimely accident in 1902, her Legacy continues through each one of us!

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ST. TERESA'S COLLEGE (AUTONOMOUS), ERNAKULAM

A BRIEF ACCOUNT

St. Teresa's College Ernakulam is a Catholic institution of higher learning for women. It was established in 1925 by the Carmelite Sisters of St. Teresa under the leadership of Mother Teresa of St. Rose of Lima, the foundress of the congregation. Mother Foundress envisioned an educational institution that would be a home, inspiration and guiding force to mould, enlighten and empower generations of women. The college is proud of and faithful to the vision of its initiator and is committed to women empowerment through excellence in teaching, learning and research. The college is a minority institution, but, it has an all-India and all-denomination membership; and has students and teachers from various communities, different parts of India and even abroad. The "Fear of the Lord is the Beginning of Wisdom" is the motto of the college.

St. Teresa's College is the first women's college in Cochin and the second in the state of Kerala. It holds the honour of being the first aided college for women in the state. St. Teresa's was first affiliated to Madras University, and later to Kerala University. With the establishment of Mahatma Gandhi University in 1983, it became one of its affiliated colleges. It was started in 1925 and the first Principal was Rev. Sr. Beatrice.

Mother Digna, the illustrious Principal of the college for 27 years, between 1944 and 1976 was instrumental in transforming the College into a reputed academic institution and into a much sought after destination for higher education for women. The dazzling vision and prudence coupled with unswerving devotion and dedication of all the Principals and Managers, who took the mantle of the college after Mother Digna, further expanded the horizon of the college. Under them the college grew in size and stature. Presently, Rev. Sr. Chris, CSST, the Superior General of the CSST Congregation is the President of the Board of Management of the College, Rev. Dr. Sr. Celine E. (Dr. Sr. Vinitha) CSST, the Provincial Superior is the Manager, Rev. Sr. Emeline CSST is the Director and Dr. Alphonsa Vijaya Joseph is the Principal of the College.

With state of the art facilities, dedicated faculty and a unique blend of intellectual rigour and ethical trust, St. Teresa's College has been recognized many a time for its adherence to high standards of quality and excellence. It was accredited by the NAAC at 'five star' level in 1999 and re-accredited in the 2nd cycle at 'A' level in 2006 and in the 3rd cycle with CGPA 3.40 in 2012. In the year 2010, the University Grants Commission recognized St. Teresa's as 'College with Potential for Excellence'. In the year 2014, the UGC conferred Autonomy to the college. In August 2019, the College got re-accredited by NAAC with A++ Grade and CGPA of 3.57 in the fourth cycle. In NIRF (National Institute Ranking Framework) St. Teresa's College has consistently maintained its position among the top 50 educational institutes and is currently ranked in the 41st position.



The high standards maintained by the college in terms of research have ensured regular funding from various agencies. In 2012 five science departments of the college were recognized for their research by DST-FIST. In 2017 five departments of the college were awarded financial support under the DBT Star College Scheme.

With three campuses in the heart of Cochin city: the Arts Block in the main campus on Park Avenue Road, the Science Block on T.D. Road and the Central Block on Market Road, St. Teresa's College, offers 25 undergraduate programmes which include three vocational courses and 23 postgraduate programmes which include a masters programme in vocational course. It also offers 5 UG Diploma programmes, 3 PG Diploma programmes, 1 integrated M.A. programme, 1 Diploma and 1 PG Diploma programmes in association with International Education Development Programme (IEDP), USA. 7 Post Graduate departments of the institution are recognised research centres of the Mahatma Gandhi University and they offer Ph.D programmes in the respective disciplines. Participation of students in extra-curricular activities is expected and encouraged to ensure that education at St. Teresa's is a total learning experience. The college also has the following bodies functioning under it, which adds to its strength: Women's Study Centre, Continuing Education Centre of Govt. of Kerala, and IGNOU Study Centre.

St. Teresa's College has the distinction of securing awards and honors for its outstanding performance consistently. All through the years, it has been securing the highest number of ranks, distinctions, first classes and pass percentage at the Mahatma Gandhi University Examinations. It was the first recipient of the prestigious and highly coveted R. Shankar award given to the Best College in Kerala for all round excellence. The College was privileged to be conferred with the same award in 1995, 1998 and 2000. The college received the Rajiv Gandhi Award for the Best College in Kerala in 1999. The college also received the Fr. Joseph Thannippara Educational Trust Award for the Best Women's College in the State of Kerala in 2001 and 2002 consecutively. The College received the Best College Award from the Xavier Board of Christian Higher Education in 2007-2008 and the Mother Teresa Award for Educational Excellence and the Rajiv Gandhi Campus Cultural Forum Award for Best College in 2009. In 2013, the college was awarded the VIT Award for the best arts and science college in South India. In the year 2014 the college also received the National award on e-governance for the e-Jalakam project of the Economics department. The college was honoured with the Paristhithimithra Award instituted by CEERD, St. Stephen's College, Uzhavoor (2016 & 2021) and Suchitwa Haritha Award instituted by Mithradam and Rajagiri outreach in 2015-16. In 2016-17, the Lioness Board of the Lions Club International selected St. Teresa's College as the 'Best



College Supporting Women's Education in Kerala.' In 2022-23, the college was bestowed the Kerala State Renewable Energy Award and it was received from Sri. Krishnankutty, Hon. Minister for Electricity, Government of Kerala. The college also bagged the Higher Education Minister's Excellence Award and the Best College Excellence Award by Prides of Kerala and received it from Shri. Faggan Singh Khulaste, Honourable Minister for Rural Development and Steel, Government of India. In 2023, the Teresian Karshakashree project of St. Teresa's College won the prestigious International Green Gown Awards 2023 endorsed by the UNEP (United Nations Environment Programme), under the category of "Next Generation Learning and Skills". The International Green Gown Awards are supported by the Association of Commonwealth Universities (ACU), International Association of Universities (IAU) and Higher Education Sustainability Initiative (HESI), Kerala.

The College bagged Kerala State Energy Conservation Award 2018 and Kerala State Renewable Energy Award 2018 Commendation Certificate instituted by Government of Kerala for the initiatives towards popularisation of renewable energy. It also won National Energy Conservation Award 2019 instituted by the Ministry of Power, Govt. of India for all the energy conservation initiatives under I CONNECT. (Initiatives towards Conservation Of Nature And Energy Co-ordinated By Teresians).

It was also identified as a mentor institution for UGC's PARAMARSH Scheme to mentor seven non-accredited institutions and get them accredited by 2022. St Teresa's college is a RUSA beneficiary institute under the Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA). It is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS), launched in 2013 which aims at providing strategic funding to eligible state higher educational institutions. Our college has been allocated Rs 2 crore under this plan by RUSA for the future development needs in terms of the Master Plan of the College.

The green activities of the Bhoomitra Sena Club (BMC) of the college, including its green protocol serve as models for other institutions and have won accolades from various agencies over the years the latest ones being best Club award amongst colleges in Central kerala in 2017 from the Department of Environment and Climate Change, Government of Kerala and the best environment project award by World Malayalee Council in 2019. In 2018, our initiative STEP (Society of Teresians for Environment Protection) received a citation from the Govt. of Kerala for plastic reduction activities.

St. Teresa's College has reigned as champions in the Mahatma Gandhi University Youth Festival for 7 consecutive years. The college has emerged victorious 24 times in the history of Mahatma Gandhi University youth festival including 2023 when the college won the Overall Championship.

Today the college is home to nearly 4200 students, 220 faculty members and 74 non-teaching staff.

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ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

- Age Limit: There is no age limit for applying to various Post Graduate Programmes conducted in colleges affiliated to the University.
- Academic eligibility should be satisfied as on the closing date of application for admission.
- If an applicant for admission is found to have indulged in ragging in the past or if it is noticed later, admissions shall be denied or she shall be expelled from the educational institution.
- (i) Candidates should have passed the corresponding Degree Examination under the 10 + 2 + 3 pattern with one core/main subject and two complementary/subsidiary subjects from any of the Universities in Kerala or of any other University recognized by Mahatma Gandhi University as equivalent thereto for admission, subject to the stipulation regarding marks. OR No candidate shall be admitted to the PG Degree programme unless she possesses qualification and minimum requirement thereof.
(ii) Candidates who have passed Degree Examination with Double or Triple main subject or candidates who have passed the Degree Examination in Vocational or Specialized Programmes are also eligible for admission. However, they have to submit copy of the Equivalency/Eligibility Certificate from Mahatma Gandhi University, stating that, their Qualifying Examination is recognized for seeking admission to the relevant P.G. Degree Course(s) as applicable, at the time of admission. This provision is not applicable in the case of those applicants who have passed their qualifying examination from MG University.

THE INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL (IQAC)

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of St. Teresa's College channelizes and systematizes the efforts and measures of the College towards academic excellence with the following goals.

- To develop a quality system for conscious, consistent and catalytic programmed action to improve the academic and administrative performance.
- To promote measures for institutional functioning towards quality enhancement through internalization of quality culture and institutionalization of best practices.
- Promotion of Research and Consultancy Services of faculty members.
- To ensure quality in all the operations of the institution and to ensure stakeholders satisfaction IQAC took up the continuous task of planning, monitoring and evaluating the activities of the college during the year.

The College, owing to its excellent performance in NAAC is identified as a Mentor institution under the PARAMARSH scheme of UGC, which intends to promote consistently high performing institutions to Mentor the NAAC aspiring institutions to get accredited. Under this scheme, the IQAC imparts mentoring to seven mentee institutions by enabling them to elevate their academic performance, enhance their overall quality and thereby secure the NAAC accreditation.

Another initiative of the IQAC is the establishment of Teresian Teaching Learning Centre (TLC) which will have a vital role in developing, promoting and implementing innovative methodologies for quality enhancement in the teaching-learning system of the Institution, with the ultimate aim of producing human resources of the highest professional and personal quality in the service of the Nation.

TIBIC

The Teresian Innovation and Business Incubation Centre (TIBIC) established in 2018 promotes entrepreneurship among girls and women on a wider scale and includes stakeholders from the public domain. The centre aims to be a self sustained business incubator that nurtures and empowers aspiring women entrepreneurs with innovative ideas of social relevance, thereby encouraging a culture of entrepreneurship and self employability especially in the domains of fashion and textile management, food technology, tourism and home decor. TIBIC is supported by Kerala State Industries Development Corporation (KSIDC) and works in collaboration with Kerala Startup Mission (KSUM), Govt. of Kerala.

The Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Cell (IEDC) of St.Teresa's College, also established in 2018, is an active student-run cell managed by the IEDC Executive Committee that seeks to create and promote innovation and entrepreneurship skills among the students of the institution. The cell is supported by Kerala Startup Mission (KSUM) and works alongside TIBIC to inculcate a culture of innovation driven entrepreneurship among students and translate latent ideas into viable enterprises.

In keeping with the requirements of the MHRD, Govt. Of India, an Institute's Innovation Council (IIC) was formulated in 2018. The council comprises of students, teachers and industry experts and organises the Innovation and entrepreneurship activities prescribed by the MIC (MHRD's Innovation Cell) in a time bound fashion. The IIC also prepares the institution for the Atal Ranking of Institutions on the Innovation Achievements Framework.

02. EXAMINATIONS

The Examination cell of St. Teresa's College (Autonomous) was established in the year 2014 as a statutory body constituted in accordance with the UGC guidelines for autonomous colleges. The prime responsibility of the Cell is to plan and conduct all examinations in a fair, transparent and systematic manner as per the Examinations Calendar prepared at the beginning of each academic year. The examination procedures are in accordance with the guidelines given in the approved Examination Manual and also conforming to the guidelines provided by MG University and UGC from time to time.

Regulations for Under Graduate Programmes (CBCSS)

Evaluation of all UG courses consists of two components, viz. In-Semester Assessment & End- Semester Assessment. The End-Semester examination of all courses are conducted by the College on the close of each semester. Internal evaluation is done by continuous assessment.

For continuous assessment within a semester, 2 Test papers, Attendance, Assignment/ Project/Internship are the 4 components which are together called In-Semester Assessment (ISA) and are conducted by the course teachers as per the scheme and syllabus.

The End Semester Assessment (ESA) are conducted for theory / practical papers (courses) as per the requirement of the programme. Evaluation of project / dissertation and viva voce examination also are conducted as per the scheme and syllabus.

The ratio between marks allotted for Internal or In-Semester Assessment (ISA) & External or End- Semester Assessment (ESA) is 1:4.

PASS CRITERIA

- A separate minimum of 30% marks each for ISA and ESA (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 35% is required for a pass in a course.
- For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of Grade D is required for all the individual courses.
- If a candidate secures F Grade for any one of the courses in a semester/programme, only F grade will be awarded for that semester/programme until she improves this to D Grade or above within the permitted period.
- Students who complete the programme with D grade will have one betterment chance within 12 months, immediately after the publication of the result of the whole programme.

Credit Point and Credit Point Average

- For reappearance/improvement of I, II, III & IV semesters, candidate have to appear along with the next batch.
- There shall be supplementary exams only for V semester (no improvement) in the respective academic year.
- Notionally registered candidates can also apply for the said supplementary examinations.
- A student who registers her name for the end semester assessment for a semester will be eligible for promotion to the next semester.
- A student who has completed the entire curriculum requirement, but could not register for the Semester examination can register notionally, for getting eligibility for promotion to the next semester.
- A candidate who has not secured minimum marks/credits in ISA can re-do the same registering along with the ESA for the same semester, subsequently.
- There shall be no improvement for internal evaluation.

REGULATIONS FOR POST GRADUATE PROGRAMMES CSS

Evaluation of all PG courses shall be carried out using direct grading system. It consists of two components, viz. In-Semester Assessment & End- Semester Assessment. The End-Semester examination of all courses are conducted by the College on the close of each semester. Internal evaluation is done by continuous assessment. The ratio between weightage for Internal or In-Semester Assessment (ISA) & External or End-Semester Assessment (ESA) is 1:3.

Pass criteria

A minimum C grade is required for a pass in both ISA and ESA. Also a minimum C grade is required for a pass in a course.

A student who registers for a particular semester examination shall be promoted to the next semester. A student having 73% attendance and fails to register for examination of a particular semester will be allowed to register notionally and is promoted to the next semester, provided application for notional registration shall be submitted within 15 days of the commencement of the next semester.

If a student represents her Institution/ University / State/ Nation in Sports /NCC/NSS or Cultural or any other officially sponsored activities such as college union/university union etc she shall be eligible to claim the attendance for the actual number of days participated subject to a maximum of 15 days in a semester based on the specific recommendations of the Head of the Department or teacher concerned.

Reappearance / Improvement

- A student who fails to secure a minimum grade (Grade C) for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.
- The candidates who wish to improve the grade/grade point of the End-Semester Assessment of a course /course she has passed can do the same by appearing in the End-Semester Assessment of the semester concerned along with the immediate junior batch. This facility is restricted to first and second semesters of the programme.
- There shall be supplementary examinations (no improvement) for third semester.
- One Time Betterment Programme: A candidate will be permitted to improve the CGPA of the programme within a continuous period of four semesters immediately following the completion of the programme allowing only once for a particular semester. The CGPA for the betterment appearance will be computed based on the SGPA secured in the original or betterment appearance of each semester whichever is higher.

If a candidate opts for the betterment of CGPA of a programme, she has to appear for the external examination of the entire semesters excluding practicals/project/comprehensive viva voce. One time betterment programme is restricted to students who have passed in all courses of the programme at the regular (first) appearance.

Computation of CGPA

Credit Point (CP) of each course is calculated using the formula **CP = C x GP**, where **C = Credit** for the course; GP = Grade point for the course.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) is the ratio of sum of the credit points of all courses taken by a student in the semester to the total credit for that semester. After the successful completion of a semester, SGPA of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.

$$\text{Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)} = \frac{\text{Total Credit Points (TCP)}}{\text{Total Credits (TC)}}$$

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) for the programme is calculated as follows:

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{((TCP)_1 + \dots + (TCP)_4)}{(TC_1 + \dots + TC_4)} \quad \text{where } (TCP)_1, \dots, (TCP)_4 \text{ are the Total Credit Points}$$

in each semester and **TC₁, ..., TC₄** are the **Total Credits** in each semester.

Note: A separate minimum of **C** Grade each for ISA and ESA (for both theory and practical) is required for pass for a course. For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of Grade **C** is required for all the individual courses. If a candidate secures **D** Grade for any one of the courses offered in a Semester/Programme only **D** grade will be awarded for that Semester/Programme until he/she improves this to **C** grade or above within the permitted period.



GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS AND EXAMINATION RULES

1. ELIGIBILITY CERTIFICATE

Applicants from outside the State have to get Eligibility Certificate from the Mahatma Gandhi University to join any programme in the College. The application prescribed by the University with duly attested photocopies of the original mark list and the e-payment receipt of the prescribed fee (details downloaded from the University e- payment portal) have to be sent to the Registrar of the University for obtaining the Eligibility certificate.

The University has stopped issuing eligibility certificate to CBSE and ICSE students from getting individual recognition with effect from 03/01/2005. (Uty. order No.CE/2005/Recog-1 Dt. 4-2-2005).

2. RECOGNITION OF EXAMINATIONS CONDUCTED BY THE UNIVERSITY/ BOARDS OUTSIDE KERALA

- a. When students of other Universities (outside the State) join this University, they have to apply for the recognition of their qualifying Examination in the prescribed form.
- b. The application for recognition should be accompanied by challan receipt for prescribed fee, pass certificate, migration certificate and eligibility certificate issued by this University. Migration certificate from the Institutions outside Kerala are to be forwarded along with the application for recognition.
- c. A certificate from the Principal of the College (where the student studied for the examination (ought to be recognized) should be enclosed if the pass certificate does not contain the information about the subjects taken for the examination.
- d. Applications for the recognition should reach the University office within one month from the date of admission without fail.

3. MIGRATION CERTIFICATE

Students of other Universities and boards of Secondary/Higher Secondary Education (Except State boards like VHSE, Plus Two) who join this University should produce a Migration Certificate issued by the concerned Universities and Boards.

The University has exempted the students of Higher Secondary Course (Plus Two) Vocational Higher Secondary Education Course and Technical Higher Secondary Education Course of Government of Kerala from producing Migration Certificate and getting individual recognition order (University Order No. EK.V/96 dated 26th July 1996)

4. REGISTRATION AS MATRICULATE OF THE UNIVERSITY

Students of other Universities and Boards who join this University should submit the application in the prescribed form with Migration Certificate, General form, Matriculation fee receipt and challan receipt for prescribed fee to the University through



the Principal. Application for Matriculation should reach the University Office within one month from the date of admission without fail.

5. INSTRUCTIONS FOR DIFFERENTLY ABLED STUDENTS

Persons with physical disability can avail themselves time extension for final assessments. They should apply to the Controller of Examinations on a plain paper along with medical certificates showing disability duly attested by the medical officer and a photo well in time before the commencement of assessments.

Those candidates who are visually impaired or affected by cerebral palsy with loco-motor impairment and for whose writing speed is affected permanently for any reason can use own scribe at own cost during the examination.

Such candidates who use a scribe shall be eligible for the compensatory time of 15 minutes for every hour of the examination.

Visually impaired candidates who do not use scribe will also be eligible for the compensatory time of 15 minutes for every hour of the examination.

Students who have valid reason can be exempted from writing the additional language examination for which they have to apply in the prescribed form.

6. EXEMPTION FOR PAYMENT OF EXAMINATION FEES

SC/ST students need not pay the Examination fees for two consecutive chances including regular one. The application (e-grantz) should be forwarded through the Principal.

7. CANCELLATION OF EXAMINATION & RE-REGISTRATION

- a. All End Semester Assessments written by a candidate can be cancelled.
- b. Cancellation is allowed only at the first appearance.
- c. When the assessments are cancelled, papers of the same Common/ Core/ Complementary, appeared in the previous semesters will also get cancelled. Eg. If the Part III Main of B.A. at the final year is cancelled, papers of first and second years will also be cancelled.
- d. Two chances are allowed for the cancelled papers within three years of registration of that particular examination.
- e. For cancellation and re-registration, apply to the Controller of Examination with Principal's recommendation, attested photocopy of the hall ticket and Indian Bank challan for prescribed fees within 14 days from the last Examination including Practical/Viva voce.

8. REVALUATION, SCRUTINY AND IDENTIFICATION OF PAPERS

The Degree students can apply for revaluation, scrutiny and identification of answer scripts in the prescribed form within 10 days from the date of publication of results. Change of marks in revaluation will be effected if the difference is 5% or more. If the

difference is 10% or more, the paper will be subjected to a second evaluation. There will be no refund of revaluation fee. Students will be allowed to identify their revalued papers. PG courses have double valuation and hence there is no revaluation for the PG programme.

9. SUPPLEMENTARY/IMPROVEMENT EXAMINATIONS

Degree and Post Graduate students who have failed in their In Semester/ End Semester examinations can avail the facility of supplementary examination. Two chances of supplementary examinations shall be completed within three years from the date of registration of the deferred/failed examination. However the courses of the final semester of the programme will not have supplementary examination. Students have to redo (supplementary) their In Semester examination by cancellation and re-registration as per the above said procedure.

Those who have passed the examination can improve their marks by availing themselves a single chance of improvement examination along with the immediate next regular examination of that particular course (applicable for the I and II year degree and IPG students only and no improvement for the III year degree and II PG students. However, there will not be a chance for improvement for the In Semester examination.

10. GRACE MARKS

1. The grace marks given below are for the activities performed by the candidate in a year. The performing year shall be from 1st June to 31st May.
2. No candidate can claim Grace Marks for both NCC and NSS
3. Maximum Grace Marks awarded to a candidate in a particular year for all the activities together should not exceed 25%.
4. Options for grace marks distribution (Choose any one of the following)

a. Option I: The candidate can submit application before the Semester Examination begin. In this case the eligible grace marks will be equally distributed for all written courses in the performing year.

b. Option II:

- The candidate can submit application online on the dates specified by the Exam Cell. In this case, the eligible grace marks can be distributed for courses for which the candidate failed.
- The candidate can submit application online on the dates specified by the Exam Cell. In this case, the eligible grace marks can be distributed for courses for which the candidate failed.
- The remaining marks if any, shall be equally distributed for all courses in the performing year. Grace marks need not be awarded to a student if she secures less than 5% of the maximum marks for the final examination of that Course.



- Grace marks will be distributed according to the University rules. This may vary from time to time on the basis of amendments made by the University.
- Candidates with hearing and speaking impairment of 40% or above are eligible to receive grace marks only on production of a medical certificate obtained from a Medical Board.
- Eligible Grace Marks shall be given for regular Examination of the performing year only.
- The grace marks effected to a Course shall be carried over to its reappearance/ improvement in the immediate next chance.
- Grace points awarded shall not be considered for ranking.
- The candidate shall submit the application to the Controller of Examinations through the Head of the Department in the prescribed format along with the relevant documents in original and a photocopy after verification by the following officers:
 1. Sports & Games : HOD of Physical Education Dept.
 2. NCC : NCC Officer of College
 3. NSS : NSS Programme Coordinator
 4. Cultural : Student Deans of College
 5. Differently abled students : Office of Divyangjan Services.

Applications not conforming to the above rules will be rejected.

11. CONFIDENTIAL MARKLIST

Candidates who have done their final year Examination can apply in the prescribed form for confidential mark list before the publication of the results for employment and educational purposes. However this mark list will be sent only to the head of the Institution concerned.

12. DEGREE AND PROVISIONAL CERTIFICATES

For the students from 2019 UG Admissions and 2020 PG admissions the Provisional Certificates shall be issued by the College on the request/ submission of application by the students along with fee through the College portal

All students should apply for their original Degree Certificate by remitting the fee for the same through Mahatma Gandhi University e-payment portal and download the applications for the same from Mahatma Gandhi University website (www.mgu.ac.in) and send it to the Controller of Examinations of Mahatma Gandhi University along with the original e-payment receipt and the copies of other required documents.

13. DUPLICATE COPY OF CERTIFICATE

Duplicate Degree Certificate and Migration Certificate can be obtained from the University and Duplicate mark list can be obtained from the College by producing a declaration on



a stamp paper of Rs.100/- (to the effect that the certificate has been irrecoverably lost), attested by a Notary Public along with a bank challan for the prescribed fees

14. CONDONATION OF SHORTAGE IN ATTENDANCE

Applications for condonation of shortage in attendance shall be made by the candidate in the prescribed format. Condonation of shortage of attendance shall be obtained seven (07) days before commencement of the respective End Semester examinations. Students having a minimum of 73% attendance for each subject can register for the examination of respective subjects.

Condonation of shortage of attendance shall be granted as follows:

- The application shall be forwarded to the Controller of Examination with the prescribed fee.
- Condonation of the attendance is allowed only on valid grounds including one as deemed appropriate by the Principal.
- Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days is allowed in the case of each subject in a semester.
- Condonation of shortage of attendance is granted to a maximum of two times during the whole period of the programme. However, condonation for a student shall be granted only once in an academic year.
- Condonation shall be granted only once for one-year programme.
- Students shall produce valid documentary evidence as required while applying for condonation.

The processing of applications for condonation of shortage of attendance shall be done immediately and the order of the Principal sanctioning condonation of shortage of attendance shall also be issued to ascertain the eligibility of the student for registration to the examination.

Applications not conforming to the above rules shall be rejected.

15. MALPRACTICES IN THE EXAMINATIONS

Malpractices in the Examinations includes any act or acts by a candidate or by his/her agents performed with the intention of gaining undue advantage in the evaluation resorting to unfair means during the examination or afterwards. Causing obstruction of the smooth conduct of examination, preventing others from appearing for the examination, causing interruption in their performance at the examination and tampering with the records of the examination are also included within the purview of malpractices.

After considering the enquiry report, the Malpractice Enquiry Committee, and the Controller of Examinations shall impose the punishment upon the candidate. The nature and possibility of punishment will be decided based on the evidence furnished.



Different types of malpractices and the punishments for them are given below:

In any other case of malpractice not listed above, the Principal of the College shall take appropriate action with the report of Malpractice Enquiry Committee..

All Rules and regulations are subject to change as and when modified by MG University to which St. Teresa's College [Autonomous] is affiliated.

RULES FOR COLLECTION & REFUND OF FEES

1. Mode of Collection of Tuition Fees

The tuition fees will be collected at the beginning of each Semester in the months of June and October. The first instalment of fees including the special fee prescribed will be collected from the students of senior classes within a period of ten consecutive working days beginning from the date of reopening of the College. In the case of junior classes, the instalment of tuition fees due till the date of admission with special fee and caution deposit will be collected on the date of admission. The Principal of the college may fix the due date of collection of fees for each term for various classes within seven consecutive working days.

2. Payment of fine for default

If any student fails to pay the fee on the due date, she shall be liable to pay a fine of Rs.5/- along with the fee or special fee on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the 10th day falls on a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10th day.

3. Consequences of non-payment of fee

If the fee or special fee with a fine of Rs.5/- is not paid on or before the last date fixed, an additional fine of Rs.5/- will be incurred. If the fee and fines are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the College with effect from the date following the expiry of this period and this student will not get the benefit of attendance from the date of removal from the rolls of the College. If the student is to be re-admitted she shall have reapply with a special permission from the Principal and will also have to remit all the arrears of fees with fine. Re-admission fee of Rs. 50/- will be realized in such cases. The re-admitted student will get the benefit of attendance of re-admission only from the date of re-admission.



4. Publication of the names of defaulters

The names of defaulters will be published on the notice board immediately after expiry of the last date fixed for payment of fees.

5. Payment of fees in certain other cases

Students, who are admitted for a term for making up shortage of attendance for the course which the student had been undergoing, should pay one third of the tuition fees for the year together with full special fee and caution deposit at the time of admission. Only such former students of the College shall be admitted as term students.

6. Payment of fees by students on rolls

Every student is liable to pay the prescribed fee for the whole term during any part of which her name is on the roll of the College.

7. Collection of late admission fee

In case of students admitted late after the commencement of the academic year, the fees for the preceding months if any, will be collected at the time of admission. No student shall be enrolled after the beginning of a term unless she has paid all the instalments of fees, which she would have had to pay had her name been on the rolls from the beginning of the term.

8. If the student does not pay the dues till the last date prescribed she will not be allowed to appear for the Examination.

9. Fee will be received in the College Office only on collection days from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

10. There is also provision for online fee payment through college web portal.

Note: Rules concerning the collection of fees will be subject to University Stipulation.

Any student seeking admission will have to pay the fees prescribed before her name is enrolled.

Those students who discontinue their studies should inform the fee counter immediately. Otherwise they will have to pay the complete fees when applying for Transfer Certificate and other Certificates.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

The code of conduct for students is intended to foster and protect the fundamental mission of

St. Teresa's College (Autonomous), Ernakulam, to provide a safe and secure learning environment, and aim at the integral formation of intellectually creative, emotionally mature, morally responsible, spiritually enlightened, socially committed and truly liberated young women.



The code applies to all students including UG students, PG students, research scholars and those who are engaged in other part-time pursuits within the college. Students shall abide by the rules and regulations of the college and maintain the highest standards of discipline and dignified manner of behaviour both inside and outside the college campus and uphold the esteem of the college. This code shall apply to all kinds of conduct of students that occur on the college premises, and any off-campus conduct that has or may have serious consequences or adverse impact on the interests or reputation of the college.

1. All students of the college have to wear identity tags on the premises of the college and outside the college if they are representing the college.
2. Misuse of the infrastructural facilities provided - internet, laboratory, library and the like - for illegal and improper purposes or in violation of college regulations, will be dealt with strict disciplinary action.
3. Students are expected to handle the furniture, equipment, fixtures and appliances of the college and laboratory carefully. In the event of property damage by the students, they will have to bear the cost of replacement/repair with a fine.
4. Students who intend to represent the college in intercollegiate events shall take prior permission from the Head of the Institution.
5. Political activity in any form is not permitted on the college campus. Unauthorised meetings, propaganda work, processions or fund collections are forbidden within the college, in hostels, and outside the college.
6. Any action that causes physical or emotional harm to any person, students, teachers, staff or any other person whether or not a member of the college community, will be considered major misconduct on the part of the student.
7. Violence of any kind such as assault, fighting, injuring others, manhandling and other such debasing behaviour; outraging or attempting to outrage the modesty of any person; possession of weapons, explosives or any other similar materials that are dangerous to the safety of any member of the College community; threatening the lives or peace of others on the campus or in its precincts, are strictly prohibited.
8. Conduct that seriously and materially harms the goals, pursuits, ethical standards or the learning environment on the campus, is strictly prohibited. Such conduct includes:
 - a) Wilful disobedience of instructions from the college authorities which includes teachers, administrative staff of the College, hostel warden or any other person associated with the teaching and administrative work of the College
 - b) Disrupting peace and order in the college, including riotous or disorderly behaviour; wilful damage to College property; malicious bringing down or maligning of the status or reputation of the College.



9. Students are prohibited from any act of discrimination (physical or verbal) based on an individual's gender, caste, race, religion or religious beliefs, colour, region, language, disability, sexual orientation, marital or family status, physical or mental disability, gender identity, etc.
10. Ragging is Strictly Prohibited in the Campus: Ragging means any act, or disorderly conduct, to a student of an educational institution, which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raising apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to that student.

Punishment for Ragging: The Management is empowered to take appropriate disciplinary action, which includes suspension or dismissal, against the student who involves in ragging. Such students will also be liable under the Kerala Prohibition of Ragging Act, 1998, and any other law which prohibits ragging. The punishment imposed under the Kerala Prohibition of Ragging Act, 1998, is not a bar to the college taking separate action against the accused students.

11. Students are prohibited from doing dishonest acts which include lying, theft or fraud, dishonesty in any academic work or any other aspect of college functioning.
12. Students are strictly prohibited from doing any of the following acts:
 - Consumption or possession of alcohol on the College premises.
 - Use of drugs, narcotics/psychotropic or similar substances.
 - Entering the college premises after consuming and under the influence of alcohol, drugs, narcotics/psychotropics or any related substances.
 - Bringing, or being party to any effort or scheme to bring alcohol or any of the aforementioned substances into the College campus
 - Supplying drugs or narcotics/psychotropic substances to a member of the student community regardless of where the supply occurs.
13. Students are expected to adhere to dressing code that embellishes the cultural values and ethos of the college.
14. Students are expected not to interact, on behalf of the college, with media representatives or invite media persons onto the campus without the permission of the college authorities.
15. Students are not permitted to either audio or video record any matter that intrudes into the privacy of any member of the college without their prior permission or harms the reputation of the college .
16. Students are expected to use social media carefully and responsibly. They cannot post contents or comments derogatory to other individuals within the college on social media or indulge in any such related activities having grave ramifications on the reputation of the college.



17. Students should disclose a pre-existing health condition, which requires emergency medical intervention, either physical or psychological, to the head of the department.
18. Insubordination and unbecoming language or misconduct on the part of a student is sufficient reasons for his/her suspension or dismissal.

If there is a case against a student for a possible breach of code of conduct, then a standing investigating committee will be formed to recommend a suitable disciplinary action who shall inquire into the alleged violation and accordingly suggest the action to be taken against the said student.

The committee may meet with the student to ascertain the misconduct and suggest one or more of the following disciplinary actions based on the nature of misconduct.

- (a) Warning - Indicating that the action of the said delinquent student was in violation of the Code and any further acts of misconduct shall result in severe disciplinary action.
- (b) Restrictions- Reprimanding and Restricting access to various facilities on the campus for a specified period of time.
- (d) Suspension - A student may be suspended for a specified period of time which will entail prohibition on participating in activities in the college.
- (e) Expulsion - Expulsion of a student from the college permanently.

**Appeal* : If the delinquent student is aggrieved by the imposition of any of the aforementioned penalties, she may appeal to the head of the institution.

Student shall seek prior permission of the Principal:

- To conduct meetings in the College buildings or anywhere in the College premises
- To use Megaphone, loudspeakers etc. and posters, banners or boards to be put up on the campus.
- To publish matters in Newspapers, Magazines, Journals or Social media in the name of the College.

Students who do not adhere to the rules will not be permitted to attend the class. Serious misconduct will result in removal from the rolls.

ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Attendance shall be marked at the beginning of each class, whether lecture, practical, or tutorial, by the teacher-in-charge of the class. Students should occupy their respective seats before attendance is taken. They should not leave the classroom, nor should late comers enter the classroom without the permission of the teacher-in-charge of the class.

No student shall absent herself from class without leave. The student shall bear in mind that proper and timely submission of application for leave of absence is a prerequisite



for applying for exemption from shortage of attendance. A proper medical certificate should accompany the leave application when the period of leave extends to more than five days or synchronizes with the date on which End Semester or In Semester Assessments are held. If leave is required for a single hour only, application may be made to the teacher-in-charge of the class during the hour. If leave is required for the afternoon session only, the student should appear in person before the head of the department concerned and get the application for leave recommended by her.

IDENTITY CARDS

Every student is expected to wear their identity cards with photographs attested by the Principal while on campus and when travelling to and fro from the College. Failure to do so will invite strict disciplinary actions. Students should produce their identity cards for inspection whenever they are required to do so by the members of the Staff or the College authorities. The identity cards must also be presented at the time of payment of each installment of fees, while taking the hall tickets, mark lists and other certificates and also in the library. If the card is lost, a duplicate may be issued at the student's expense by paying Rs.150/- with the special permission of the Principal on submission of a written request for a duplicate card, attested by the parent or guardian.



03. INFRASTRUCTURE FACILITIES

THE COLLEGE LIBRARY

The College library is the key resource of information for the academic community. It was established along with the College in 1925 and was named the "Mother Veronica Library" in fond memory of Mother Veronica, the Superior General of the Congregation. The present library was built to commemorate the Golden Jubilee of the College in 1975 and was formally inaugurated in 1981.

The Library Block Consists of

1. General reference section
2. Periodical section.
3. Audio Visual room.
4. Stackroom with lending section.
5. Post Graduate section.
6. Research wing.
7. Digital Library
8. Reprography Corner
9. Archive

Special sections are maintained for Career guidance, Value education, Gandhian studies and Kerala history. Computer database and Internet facilities are also available. At present there are 102872 books and 82 journals and periodicals in the library. For convenience, Department Libraries for Science subjects are maintained in the Science Block. A general library wing also functions in the Science Block. The Library is open from 8.a.m.to 6 p.m. on all working days. A library Committee that includes the representatives of Teachers and students help to direct the library services.

LIBRARY RULES

1. Strict silence should be observed in the Library.
2. Books and other personal belongings should not be taken in to the Library. You can use the propt counter for the same. However each student may take a note book with her.
3. UG Students can borrow 2 books; Teachers, Research Scholars & PG students can borrow 5 books at a time for 14 days subject to the renewal after which it can be kept for another 7 days. Books which are not returned after the due date will incur a fine Rs.1/- per day.
4. All the books should be returned on the date marked on the date label found on the front page of the book. Absence from College will not be an excuse for not returning the books on time.



5. Use of mobile phones and cameras strictly restricted at the library premises.
6. Loss of books needs to be reported to the Library Staff as soon as possible. Lost books will have to be replaced or the cost of the books will be collected. The cost of the lost books will be assessed as multiples for each decade according to the year of publication of the book.
7. The Library follows an open access system. The users can retrieve the catalogue from the OPAC system which is placed at the entrance of the library.
8. Borrowers are responsible for the books marked against their name. In case of damage they shall pay the cost of replacement or rebinding. If a book is noticed to be damaged at the time of issue, it should be brought to the attention of the library staff.
9. Every user is supposed to enter the details of the books and journals issued as well as referred, in the issue register provided at the counter.
10. Students should return their borrower's ticket to the Library before they claim their Transfer Certificate.
11. No student shall lend either the borrower's tickets or the books to a fellow student or outsiders.
12. Scribbling and mutilating the books will be severely dealt with.
13. Books taken out of the Library shall be returned when asked for.
14. In all matters regarding the Library, the decision of the Principal shall be final.
15. The Main Library and the Science Block Library offer free internet access.
16. The library has an active library club. Students who are interested can be its members.
17. Reference books are meant for in-house library reading however it will be issued for overnight reference as per the request.
18. Library offers internships and Interested students can make use of the opportunity. Students will be provided with a certificate of honorary services.
19. All final year PG students have to submit their project report in the library for plagiarism check and collect their certificate of plagiarism before their Viva-Voce.

The media production lab provides students state-of-the-art facilities for creating audio-visual products such as commercials, short films, documentaries, audio messages and videos in television and Internet formats. LANGUAGE LAB

Department of Communicative English The state-of-the-art English Language Lab, established in 1995, provides students the opportunity to hone their language skills, perfect pronunciation, and move closer to near-native fluency. The lab, integrated with the college Computer Lab, is fitted with a projector, 30 computers, each with a headphone. Eighteen of the systems feature automated ETNL Language Lab software, which is equipped with multimedia courseware to train students. The software is designed to deliver content to students according to the individual's linguistic ability, ensuring they develop their confidence along with English speaking skill.

AUDIOVISUAL ROOM

To facilitate effective learning the College is equipped with the latest multimedia enabled audio-visual classrooms.

RESIDENCE OF STUDENTS

Residence facilities are provided for the students in the College campus. There are three hostels: one in the Main Block, one in the Central Block and one in the Science Block. Students are accommodated in these hostels. The atmosphere in these residence halls provides a feeling of "home away from home." The application to these hostels should be given on the day of admission itself.

TUTORIAL SYSTEM

There is an efficient tutorial system in the college with 30 students being closely monitored and guided by the concerned teachers. Efficient counseling is given to the students.

VALUE EDUCATION

The College offers value education classes once in a week to all the students. A three-day Life Guidance Seminar is a compulsory programme for the third year degree students.

To foster the faith formation of Christian students, the College offers the following facilities: Jesus Youth Programme, Prayer Meeting, Rosary in the month of October and other prayer sessions on special occasions.

EUCCHARISTIC CELEBRATION

In the beginning of each year an inaugural mass/prayer service is held in order to invoke God's blessing on the new academic year. Mass is also held on the first Friday of every month. Attendance to this is not obligatory but all are welcome. A thanks giving mass is also held at the end of the academic year to thank God for His bountiful blessings and guidance.

LIFE RENEWAL PROGRAMME

All Catholic students are expected to undergo a retreat during the Course of the academic year and spiritual discourses are arranged for non catholic students during the same time.

THE STUDENT GOVERNMENT

The College Union is the student government of the College. The Union consists of the elected representatives of the student community. It comprises of the Chairperson, the Vice Chairperson, the Secretaries of General Affairs, Arts Club and Sports, the Student Editor and two University Union Councillors the representatives of various classes and the Association Secretaries. The Union is guided by two members of the Faculty known as Student Deans.

All the Associations and clubs work under the formal auspices of the College Union. The student union organizes the 'Teresian Week'- a week long festival which showcases the literary, artistic and histrionic talents of the students. The Sports Day is also organized by the members of the Union.

STEP

STEP or Society of Teresians for Environment Protection is a charitable and literary organization formed by students and faculty of St. Teresa's College Ernakulam. It is registered under the Travancore Cochin Literary Scientific & Charitable Societies



Registration Act. 1955 (Act XII of 1955) and objectives are to carry on activities for protection and conservation of environment, promote usage of biodegradable products, promote social entrepreneurship among students, provide livelihood to Kudumbashree members, etc. All our products are stitched by the Kudumbashree members of the Cochin Corporation. As a part of implementing Green Protocol in the college campus, the students are provided an eco-friendly cloth college bag and a cloth carry bag. The cloth bags- Prakriti Bags and Bhoomithram Sanchis, are bags which serve as an alternative to bags made of rexin and plastic carry bags. The students are also provided with steel cups to make the campus free of plastic and paper cups. STEP received a special felicitation from the Department of Environment and Climate Change, Govt. of Kerala 2018 for commendable efforts in implimenting the green protocol.

UNNAT BHARAT ABHIYAN (UBA)

Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA) is a flagship programme of Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Govt. of India, that aims to enrich Rural India. The mission of UBA is to enable higher education institutions to work with the people of rural India in identifying development challenges and evolving appropriate solutions for accelerating sustainable growth. St. Teresa's College has been a Participating Institution (PI) for the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan since 2018 and has been extending services to the six villages adopted under the recommendation of the honourable District Collector. The six villages selected are Mulavukad, Njarakkal, Cheranelloor, Kunnukara, Kuzhupilly and Kumbalangi in Ernakulam district. The UBA activities are coordinated under the Teresian Rural Outreach Programme (TROP), an initiative of the College for extension and outreach activities. Extension activities of the college have been institutionalized through TROP performance card based on which students get graded certificates.

THE COLLEGE MAGAZINE

The College Magazine is an open forum where students can express their views and opinions. It is an outlet for the creative talents of the Students. The student Editor, helped by an Editorial Board and the Staff Editor, brings out the magazine to the students of the College. The magazine showcases the literary, cultural, sports activities and achievements of the students. The success of a College Magazine depends upon the students. By writing for the magazine, a student leaves behind an indelible mark of her passing through the College.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (N.S.S.)

The College has a committed N.S.S. Wing. It is a voluntary organization for the students and teachers to involve themselves in rural development programmes and to participate in the socio- economic life of the community. The focus is on activities that augment the social awareness of students and mould them into responsible citizens in the society. The students are made aware of the plight of the less privileged and disadvantaged sections in the society. Volunteers who undergo the prescribed course of training are given certificates from the University and are eligible for grace marks in University examinations. They are also awarded 15 marks as bonus marks.



NATIONAL CADET CORPS (N.C.C)

The NCC has an active army subunit functioning in the College. The NCC provides the cadets with ample opportunities to enhance their character, leadership qualities and initiative. The wide array of activities undertaken by the NCC include basic training sessions in first-aid, drill, parades, signals, home nursing, communication, map reading and weapon training. Advanced training in mountaineering, rock climbing, para jumping and cycling offer the cadets exciting vistas to quench their thirst for adventure. Apart from building a sense of patriotism, it also moulds the cadets into able and smart citizens of tomorrow.

Students are enrolled after a selection procedure. Every enrolled cadet undertakes to continue in the corps for a minimum period of two years. At the end of the period a weightage certificate will be given. Cadets can also appear for the 'B' and 'C' certificate examination. They are also eligible for bonus marks as per rules for degree course and PG Course at the time of admission.

A Senior Wing of NCC Navy with a sanctioned strength of 100 cadets was allotted for the first time to St. Teresa's College (Autonomous), Ernakulam during the academic year 2020-21. The sub-unit functions under the command of 7 Kerala Naval Unit NCC. NCC Navy Wing provides its cadets the opportunity to learn the basics of navigation, maritime security, naval communication etc. while educating them about the history, role and organisational structure of the Indian Navy. Boat Pulling, Ship visits, Yatching, Ship modelling etc are a few of the exclusive activities in Naval NCC.

SPORTS AND GAMES

Encouragement and facilities are offered to those students who wish to develop their potential in sports and games. Infrastructure and facilities are available in Basket Ball, Volley Ball, Table Tennis, Lawn Tennis, Indoor Games, Aerobics, Personal Gymnasium, Kho-kho, Ball Badminton, Shuttle Badminton, Cycling, Soft Ball, Hand Ball and Yoga. Free accommodation in the sports hostel, special food and prizes for outstanding achievements and sports quota for admission are the incentives given.

The University awards grace marks for distinguished sports persons besides the sports scholarship given to them.

STUDENT GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL COMMITTEE

The objective of the Student Grievance Redressal Committee is to provide opportunities for redress of grievances of students already enrolled in the institution.

The SGRC of the college comprises of the principal as the chairperson and three senior teachers and one student representative as members.

ANTI-RAGGING CELL

St. Teresa's College has a vigilant cell functioning against instances of ragging. The cell takes measures to repeatedly remind students of the consequences of ragging, and



ensures that parents and new students are made aware of their rights. The anti-ragging committee is comprised of the Principal, four senior faculty members and student representatives and is constituted to prevent ragging and to take anti-ragging measures as per the guide lines issued by the Supreme Court of India and UGC. The college is proud that no instance of ragging has been reported in the recent years.
